Celebrate summer, Star-BQ style

cooking for him. We'll have over 16 hours of daylight the Sunday before so you can celebrate his day sun up or down.

Sky watch for the next

There will be a partial lunar eclipse on Monday, June 4 at about 2:48 a.m. the Earth will start to cast its shadow on the moon until it rises in the morning. Western Canada will catch a fairly good view, as the peak is at 5:03 a.m. just before it sets in eclipse mode at 5:45 a.m. in the southwest.

The transit of Venus in front of Sun takes place the next day, on Tuesday, June 5, just after 4 p.m. You can catch Venues making a rare conjunction with the sun until it sets in the night sky. You will need certified astronomy viewing solar filters to avoid blindness, as this is the hazard associated with this event. The midpoint time is 7:29 p.m.

Then, early on Thursday, June 7 at about 4 a.m., look at the northeast horizon as the Seven Sisters leads Jupiter rise just before the sun follows it while Mars follows it below left. If it's too early, the night owls can see the set together just after dinner at 7 p.m. in the northwest.

The longest day of the year is Wednesday, June 20. We will have 16 hours and 26 minutes of actual daylight. The sun officially rises at 5:21 a.m. and sets at 9:47 p.m. with high noon at 1:34 p.m
