Sky watch for the next

The crescent morning moon rises with Venus on Tuesday, June 24. Look to the northeast-east before sunrise at about 3:45 a.m. as Venus seems to cling to the moon on the way up.

See a pre-dawn Venus near Pleiades on Sunday, June 22. Look in the northeast-east at about 4 a.m. and you can see the seven sisters next to Venus before they fade away into the sunrise.

Jupiter sets with Gemini twins on Sunday, June 15 in the northwest. Jupiter sets at about 11:30 p.m. and pulls the twin stars Castor and Pollux down with it for the night.

The longest day of the year is Saturday, June 21. It is officially the summer solstice at 4:51 a.m., and we will have 15 hours and 40 minutes of actual daylight. The sun officially rises at 5:14 a.m. and sets at 8:54 p.m. with high noon at 1:34 p.m.
