Total lunar eclipse welcomes in an exciting New Year

2019 starts off with a Blood Moon on Sunday, Jan. 20 after supper.

A total lunar eclipse takes place when the Earth comes between the Sun and our satellite covering the Moon with

its shadow.

When this happens, the
Moon usually turns red,
hence the Blood Moon

It's the only major event for this year on our side of the world.

p.m., peaks at 10:12 p.m. until 10:43 p.m. and finishing off just after midnight. Therefore, given the reasonable time and 31 minute maximum eclipse time, don't miss it. Southern Alberta will get a wonderful view and the Rothney Observatory near

Priddis will be hosting this to the public. Opening at 20:30, a large crowd is expected so

arrive early.

It's a full facility with many telescopes, speaking facilities and lots of place to warm up.

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You are welcome to bring your own visual aids or

share the many on site.

The last total lunar eclipse was about a year ago and next isn't for over two years on May 26, 2021, so worth keeping the kids up for this.

Lastly, unless it's a major Chinook, dress like you're going to the North Pole as the +4,000 feet altitude makes it feel like Alaska in a short time!

Sky watch for the next month:

1 Venus at it's brightest- On Sunday, Jan. 6 rising at 4:40 am in the SEE, it blazes at -4.47 magnitude right into the morning. It's the brightest object in the night sky besides the Moon.

2 Aldebaran follows Moon- On Thursday, Jan.17 after sunset watch this planet follow our satellite overnight.

3 Jupiter & Venus Dawn rise together- On Tuesday, Jan. 22 look in the SEE at 05:00 am until sunrise as the fade into daylight.

4 Quadrantid Meteor Shower- Peaks just after New Years on Thursday, Jan. 3 after dusk going on about a week. Best viewing in the Bootes constellation (NEE) and a Moonless night you may catch up to produce some 50-100 meteors per hour
